In 1484 Pope Innocent III denounced witchcraft as heresy. From then until about 1750 when persecution died away as scepticism increased, some 200,000 supposed witches were tortured, burnt or hanged in Western Europe.

In Britain witchcraft was made a capital offence in 1563. However, it was during the years proceeding 1600 that saw the greatest number of prosecutions in this country. The rise was mainly due to the increasing influence of uncompromising Protestant sects and their interpretation of Exodus XXII, v. 18: 'Thou shalt not suffer a witch to live'.

Witchcraft was almost invariable a crime of the very poor. According to trial records most witches were impoverished women who got little out of and alleged pact with Satan.

Tragically for those accused of witchcraft, innocence was extremely difficult to prove. Evidence was twisted and corrupted; confessions were extracted by brutal means; and the sentence was invariable death.

The taking of photographs and the making of sound and/ or video recordings in the auditorium are not permitted.


Please turn mobile phones off during the performance.

History and information

Youth Action Theatre is dedicated to stimulating the love of drama and theatre through drama workshops and production experience in young people aged 15 to 25. Other than age there is no restriction to membership. Whilst the work is thoroughly enjoyed a strict disciplined approach is maintained and dedication required to achieve the maximum possible professionalism and the highest standard in the final production.

Founded in 1970, YAT's first production in spring 1971 was the *Diary of Anne Frank*. Since then, it has presented more than 70 major productions of a full range of plays

including classical, modern, progressive and musical.

Since 1981, YAT has taken a production abroad approximately once every two years. The first was Godspell, which was taken to Hamburg. Berlin has been visited 3 times (Cabaret, Merrily we roll along & Pippin) along with trips to Vienna (Accrington Pals), Leipzig (The musical of Billy Liar), and Kiev (when still part of the Soviet Union) with the first ever amateur production of Blood Brothers. The summer tours of 1995 (Cider with Rosie), 1996 (Juno and the Paycock) and 1998 (Adam Bede) were all taken to the Eastern Connecticut State University, USA.

In the last few years YAT has performed several world premiere plays. All of these were written by members of YAT, the first was Genghis Khan-Child of a blue wolf by David Wheatley, followed by Briticanna and The Great Gatsby both by Colin Smith. We have also performed three plays by Jimmy Chinn; To the Island, Home Before Dark and Albert Make Us Laugh.

After this production YAT will meet at its regular workshop/ rehearsal space at Collis School, Fairfax Rd, Teddington on Monday 12th August at 7.30 pm and every Monday and Thursday thereafter. Newcomers are more than welcome!
